WHEN: The Roseway Neighborhood Association (RNA) will hold a Neighborhood Cleanup this spring on Saturday, May 11, 2019 from 9:00 am - 3:00 pm.

WHERE: 82nd Ave & NE Siskiyou in the Glenhaven Park parking lot.



WHAT TO BRING: Among the items accepted are metal, electronics, batteries, appliances, furniture, bicycles, mattresses, lawn mowers, yard debris, clothing, household items, and toys.

In addition, the cleanup is accepting reusable items for the ever-popular Reuse Me Sale.

WHAT NOT TO BRING:

Prohibited items include household hazardous waste (batteries, paint, chemicals, etc.), Construction, demolition and remodeling debris, and asbestos-containing materials.

FEES: Dropoff fees range from \$19-\$28 depending on the materials.


Come celebrate spring with us!

Neighbors vs Blackberries & Invasives at Rose City Park Bluff

Rose City Park "SOLVE IT for Earth Day"

In recent years non-native blackberries have rapidly overwhelmed the bluff along the north side of the Rose City Golf Course adjacent to NE Sacramento between 62nd and 70th.

Join friends of Rose City Park to remove invasive ivy, spurge laurel, and blackberry. Register for the "Rose City Park Invasive Plant Removal" event at https://www.solveoregon.org/.

Beginning in March 2018 an ever-growing group of neighborhood residents have volunteered to expunge these thorny invaders by hand.

The blackberries are in retreat but not yet thwarted! The group meets every Sunday morning (weather permitting) at the 62nd Avenue stairs.

The goal is remove the blackberry bushes in order to protect and encourage the many native trees and plants that exist on the bluff.



Registration for "SOLVE IT for Earth Day" is required.

The event will take place on Saturday, April 20th, from 9am-noon at the northwest corner of Rose City Park, 2300 NE 62nd Avenue.

This is a family friendly event. Dress for the weather. Wear sturdy, closed-toe shoes and clothes that you don't mind getting dirty. Bring a water bottle and snacks. If you have garden gloves please bring them as we don't have many extras to share.

2019 Update on Roseway Tree Canopy

During our Fall 2018 tree planting with Urban Forestry on the Roseway Park Blocks, we added thirteen new trees

including five new species. Our new additions on the blocks between NE Mason and NE Prescott St. include

early spring blooming Forest Pansy redbuds, Chinese pistache (great red fall foliage), Dawn redwoods (deciduous conifer),

weeping purple beech,

Bamboo leaf oak (evergreen to semi-evergreen), honey locust,

& more native Oregon white oaks.

We are still waiting on Urban Forestry to plant five trees that were not available at the time of our planting event. These include four sequoias and a sassafras on the block ends facing NE Skidmore St. We now have a very diverse group of trees on our park blocks with over 30 species! Last year, a group of students from Evergreen State College, and a tour group from the American Society of Foresters conference visited our park blocks for a tour.

The young trees on the park blocks between NE Beech and NE Mason have aged out of the two-year Urban Forestry watering and maintenance program defined by the Title 11 tree code. The

Bureau of Environmental Services has agreed to water the trees for a third and fourth summer on a more limited basis on these blocks, but weeding and mulching are now the responsibility of the neighborhood. Friends of Roseway Park Blocks is planning a spring weeding and mulching working crew with the assistance of Urban Forestry.

The annual Friends of Trees planting in the Roseway-Cully-Beaumont-Wilshire planting group will occur on April 6. 2019. We anticipate planting about 75 new trees in the Roseway neighborhood, and approximately 200 trees in total.

As always, we particularly **need truck drivers to shuttle trees and tools** from the staging site to the properties.

This will be our second year staging the event at NAYA (Native American Youth and Family Center) at 5135 NE Columbia Blvd.

Neighbors in the Roseway might not be from Jamaica, but we can still take Bob Marley's words to heart! "Let's get together and feel all right..."

Neighborhood Emergency Team Grows Stronger


Roseway and Rose City Park Neighborhood Emergency Team members have joined forces. In the event of a citywide or regional emergency such as a severe winter storm, flood or major earthquake, households need to be prepared to be on their own for at least a week. Neighborhoods need to be prepared for self-sufficiency, too. Volunteer neighborhood rescuers will likely be first on-the-scene when firefighters and police are slowed by impassable streets or overwhelmed by calls for help.

The NET program is organized by the Portland Bureau of Emergency Management and training is provided by Portland Fire & Rescue. But ultimately, teams are neighbors volunteering together in their own communities. Roseway NET formed in January, 2017.

"Meeting and training with Rose City Park makes sense," Roseway volunteer Eric Berg said. "We get more people together at the same place at the same time to learn and train." Berg adds that the service area of Fire Station #28 includes both neighborhoods.

The NET group meets at 6:30 p.m. on the 2nd Wednesday of each month at The Portland Clinic, 5005 NE Sandy Blvd. in Portland. Everyone is welcome, and you don't have to be NET-trained to volunteer. Email rosewaypdxnet@gmail.com for more information.

About 25 Roseway residents have graduated from the 28-hour Basic NET training. Citywide, more than 1,800 Portlanders are listed as active participants. For more information on the NET program, go to https://www.portlandoregon.gov/pbem/31667.
