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Funds Available for Community Watershed Stewardship

We all live in a watershed, though in the city it is not always apparent. But even where streams and wetlands have been replaced by streets and homes, there are ways we can protect and enhance the natural systems. Planting native plants and trees, building rain gardens and swales, removing impervious surfaces, and educating neighbors about the importance of a healthy watershed can all make a real difference.

Most of the Roseway Neighborhood is part of the Columbia Slough watershed. Portland's combined sewer system serves the area south of Fremont and west of 70th Avenue. Combined sewers carry both storm water runoff from streets and sewage from homes and businesses in the same pipes. When it rains, some of this mixture of sewage and storm water overflows to the Willamette River. However, when the City of Portland completes its combined sewer overflow control program next year, combined sewers will overflow an average of four times each winter and once every three summers instead of every time it rains.

But even in the parts of Roseway which have a separate sewer system for storm water, Portland's 37 inches of annual rainfall represent an opportunity that's too often missed. The rain is a resource which, with your help, can promote awareness of our connection to nature, provide habitat for wildlife, and green and beautify the neighborhood while bringing the community together.

Watershed stewardship means taking ownership of how our individual actions and lifestyles affect the watersheds where we live. The City of Portland CommunityWatershedStewardshipProgram(CWSP) provides grants of up to \$10,000 to community groups for projects that enhance watershed health. Over the last 15 years, CWSP has funded nearly 200 such projects including rain gardens, pavement removal, naturscaping, natural area restorations, and community education like curricula and community art projects.

If you would like to start your own watershed stewardship project through your community of faith, school, or other community organization CWSP can help make it a reality. The program provides project scoping, and grant writing support as well as referral for technical assistance. The annual stewardship grant application will be available in January 2011, and will be due in April 2011. Funds will be available in July 2011.

More Murals, Anyone? by Peggy Sullivan


Graffiti begets more art, if we're lucky. One of the bureaus of our fair city has a sum of money available for projects addressing both community involvement and the elimination of graffiti, and Sandy Blvd, including Roseway, is a prime area for combining the two actions. Sandra Lefrancois from Central Northeast Neighbors contacted me last month to suggest that RNA pursue it, and so we are, como no?

The goal is to find a building that gets tagged (or might be tagged) and a building owner who sees art as a benefit to business, community and posterity. The guidelines strongly suggest that spray paint is not a good medium for the mural project(s), and that the mural(s) go up on a wall with high visibility. Somewhere around \$5,000 is the amount available (of course a bit more money will be needed, realistically) and the work has to be completed by November 2011. By the time you're reading this, the Roseway Neighborhood Association will have put in a proposal for the money (to advance Sandy Blvd as a Mural District), so all we need now is the wall, the building owner, and someone to usher the project through to completion. Having helped out with the "Community in Motion" mural that graces the bicycle shop wall on 72nd Avenue, I can tell you that it's gratifying, educational, mostly fun and hardly took up any more time than any other type of birthing project. 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Be Proactive in Fighting Crime by Connie Pilcher

Roseway is fortunate to have a low crime rate but we must work to keep it that way.

There are several things one can do in preventing crime. The easiest is to keep your porch light on during the night. It has long been established the biggest deterrent to crime is good lighting. For the energy conscious homeowner Eco bulbs save energy, have a long life and are environmentally friendly.

Other programs you can participate in are Neighborhood Watch: know all the neighbors on your block; exchange phone numbers, and look out for anything suspicious. There is also the Roseway Foot Patrol! You need to be trained to participate but it only takes one hour in a small group with a police officer. The time commitment is only about one hour a week. You and a partner patrol an area in the evening at a time and day you select.

All you need is the official vest, cell phone and a flashlight. You can get more information by contacting Mary Thompkins at mary.thompkins@ ci.portland.or.us or by phone at (503) 823-3150.

Lastly REPORT ANY CRIME, no matter how insignificant. According to the police if it is not reported, it did not happen. It is important to make the call because the crime stats depend on these reports. If it is happening now call 911. If you are not quite sure call the Non-Emergency number (503) 823-3333. (An easy way to remember this number: all city numbers are 823 prefix...keep that in mind and then add the 3333.)

Radon in Roseway by Nathan Farney

In the last issue of the newsletter, I wrote about my experience testing our basement for radon. Much of Northeast Portland, especially at the top of the Alameda ridge, has elevated radon levels in basements. Radon is a radioactive gas that seeps from the ground into basements and causes lung cancer if there is extended exposure. Fortunately, it is not difficult to fix. Several people asked how my personal experience turned out, so here is the second and final installment in our ongoing saga of radon reduction. After our radon test from the hardware store came back with radon levels more than five times more than the recommended action level by the EPA, I started calling radon reduction companies in the area, and I ended up going with Ecotech LLC (http://www. ecotechllc.com/ or 503.493.1040). I was very satisfied with the whole experience. They came out initially to do a "Radon Recon" to evaluate my basement. They sketched out my basement and proposed a solution with an estimate. Their estimate was for about \$1,500 and included everything from labor to permits and parts. They installed a single suction point that creates a vacuum in the dirt under my foundation and exhausts the air above my roofline away from any windows. Although most situations don't require a second suction point, after the first measurement I still needed more radon reduction, so they installed a "T" connection and a second suction point in a different part of the basement. That second suction point cost less than \$500. This reduced our Radon levels below the EPA recommended action level (our initial reading was very high), and we are breathing much easier in our home. While the cost is not cheap, I was very relieved that a reasonable and simple fix existed for this serious health issue in my home.
