Things seem to be picking up. In Roseway, some houses are getting multiple offers, selling for 20-30 thousand above the list price. What is going on? Is Roseway doomed to burst out of the affordable category? No, not anytime soon.

Sixteen years ago when I moved to Roseway, it was because I could afford it. And Roseway is still affordable, but there is more than just affordability in Roseway.

Actually, in every neighborhood or market, there are three or four types of properties for sale. These types can be found anywhere, any price point.

- I) The fixer-cheap, needs lots of work, but has many redeeming qualities. The fixer is often good material for the investor/flipper, if those redeeming qualities are truly redeeming qualities.
- 2) The move-in-ready, granite this, granite that/ if not granite, then stainless and the yard always has pretty mulched topsoil. And
- 3) Neither 1 nor 2, so they sit and sit. In #3, they would generally have few redeeming qualities, and no stainless anything. They may even be overpriced and never sell.

What all three have in common is that they are on the market for sale and there usually is a reason the seller wants to sell. But unless a buyer has a realtor who knows where, when and what to look for, both buyer and seller will be out of luck.



They have access to contractors, inspectors, lenders – sure, all available to you on Angie's List, but the realtor has history with them, and lots of it, or they wouldn't be referring them.

Anyways, the most important thing is that the transaction is smooth and one that the client fully understands. Communication is the bottom line: house type 1-2-3. Stainless or no. Let the realtor do his/her job and be the voice.

Just in one Saturday, May 24th, in Glenhaven Park we collected over 8 tons of wood and yard debris to be made into mulch. Furthering our mission, The Rebuilding Center and Better Bargains kept many more reusable items out of the trash bin. Waterwise Gardening: 10 Simple Ways to Save Water and Money this Summer Contributed article by the Regional Water Providers Consortium, Author:

Landscapes add value, beauty and livability to our homes. With water use often doubling in the dry summer months due to outdoor watering, lawns and gardens also offer great potential to save time, money and water by making simple waterwise improvements.

In the Portland area, we receive 90 percent of our rainfall October through May. That means we use the most water during the very same months that we get the least rain. Being efficient with your water use makes sound economic and environmental sense, and helps our region meet its long-term water supply needs.

Waterwise gardening doesn't have to look like a typical southwest cactus and rock landscape. Rather, waterwise gardening practices that incorporate efficient watering tips can create beautiful landscapes that are multi-colored, vibrant and bountiful, even during the hottest summer days.

The Regional Water Providers Consortium—a group of 20+ local water providers and Metro—offers Roseway residents the following 10 tips for creating and maintaining waterwise landscapes.

Examples of water lost to leaks from an irrigation system		
HOLE Size	GALLONS PER Month Wasted	
1/4"	400,000	
3/16"	225,000	
1/8"	• 100,000	
1/16"	• 25,000	
1/32"	. 6,300	

- 1. Adjust your sprinklers to water your lawn and garden, not the street or sidewalk.
- 2. Water early in the morning (before 10 a.m.) or later in the evening (after 6 p.m.) when temperatures are cooler and evaporation is minimized.
- 3. Water established lawns about one inch per week (a bit more during hot, dry weather). Use a watering gauge or tuna can, along with a timer, to determine how long it takes your sprinkler to water one inch.
- 4. Set it, but don't forget it! Whether you have a manual sprinkler or an automatic system, adjust your watering throughout the summer to meet the needs of different plants and lawns. Check out the Weekly Watering Number at www.conserveh2o.org to see how much to water your plants and lawn each week.





5. Inspect your overall sprinkler system for leaks, broken lines or blockage in the lines. A well-maintained system will save you money, water and time, as even small leaks can waste hundreds of gallons of water each month.

6. Consider replacing some turf area with low-water plants and ornamental grasses. They are easier to maintain than turf, look beautiful and require far less water. Visit www.conserveh20.org to download a free water-efficient plant guide.

7. Group plants with similar watering needs. Creating "watering zones" in your garden will allow you to give each plant the water it requires—not too much or too little.

Protected Sick Time is here! From the Office of Commissioner Amanda Fritz

As of January 1, 2014, the City of Portland's new Protected Sick Time ordinance went into effect, providing workers in Portland with a protected right to earn sick time to use when they or a family member are sick, injured, or in need of preventive health care.

The ordinance applies to all employees who work within the geographic boundaries of the city of Portland for 240 hours or more in a calendar year. Employers with six or more employees must allow workers to earn paid sick leave. Employers with five or fewer employees are required to provide unpaid sick leave. Full, part-time,

and temporary employees should accrue one hour of job-protected sick time for every 30 hours worked and, if earned, can accumulate up to 40 hours paid or unpaid sick time per calendar year. Earned sick leave may be used in increments of one hour or greater, and may be used to cover all or part of a shift.

I encourage you to shop local, eat local, dry clean local and live local. We have wonderful people living and working right here.

Last year I posed the question, "What is the Roseway Neighborhood Association all about?" I mentioned that the board was embarking on a journey to discover more about what you, our neighbors, wanted from the RNA and what we were at our core. We knew it was going to be a long process, but I'm pleased to report that for the better part of 12 months, several board members have been regularly meeting on a mission to answer

those questions. Through their hard work a survey was distributed all over Roseway to gain a better idea about what your thoughts were. I believe we are close to completing the rebranding project we set out on with a better idea of what the Roseway Neighborhood Association should stand for. We hope to bring this project to a close by the end of this year and share with you our efforts in 2015.

In closing, the Roseway Neighborhood Association is about better serving our neighborhood and those who live here. Many of you are familiar with the three "Neighborhood Meetings" each year in April, July and October, where we feature community speakers, leaders and legislators and host activities like the Ice Cream Social.
